# Welcome from the SIEF President

Dear delegates of the 17th SIEF Congress,

At this moment in time, academic freedom is increasingly challenged; colleagues face diversity programs being dismantled, vast areas of research delegitimized based on political assumptions, and research funding cut unexpectedly. It is therefore more important than ever to reinforce the strength of our critical, academic engagement with the world. This engagement includes standing in solidarity with those affected while continuing (to dare) unwriting established hierarchies, perceived wisdoms, and innate senses of superiority.

The 17th SIEF Congress in Scotland, organized by the Elphinstone Institute for Ethnology, Folklore, and Ethnomusicology, University of Aberdeen, 3-6 June 2025, offers a vital forum for invigorating our research community through collective, cross-boundary, and critical thinking, based on the theme of Unwriting.

With more than 1,000 delegates, including 230 online attendants, SIEF2025 represents committed scholars from a broad range of countries around the world and reminds us that our community is truly globe-spanning. We can look forward to 849 papers presented in 108 exciting panels, plus 3 poster sessions and a film program containing 9 streams, showing no less than 25 ethnographic films! The Congress programme offers further exciting activities, such as working group meetings, publication workshops, and the journal reception.

Unwriting aims to foster new ways of ceding space to bottom-up research and ethnographic analysis. The keynote sessions will explore different strategies for decentering authority and for rethinking hegemonic repositories of knowledge, ending with an experimental session, spotlighting arts-based methodologies while seeking to challenge our habitual (and often written) modal habits. In the closing roundtable debate, activist strategies of counter-archiving and counter-narrating practices will be used to galvanize marginalized voices, posing the question how we can undo the power of writing that has traditionally defined "those who have only been written about."

Assaults against academics and attempts to hinder academic freedom have a long history in many countries and regions. As a special feature of SIEF2025, we offer a joint meeting space – an "Academic freedom sanctuary" – on Wednesday 4 June, at 19:45, where delegates can meet face-to-face, sharing experiences and exchange ideas in a safe environment. Everyone is welcome!

I would also like to encourage you to take part in SIEF's mentoring program for early-career scholars, organized for delegates participating face-to-face as well as online. You are also cordially invited to the SIEF2025 General Assembly, scheduled for Thursday 5 June, at 19:00, where new members for the SIEF board will be elected. After the meeting, the winner of the SIEF Young Scholar Prize 2025 will be announced.

SIEF has been committed to the task of stimulating international cooperation among scholars for more than half a century, the highlight being the biennial conference. 1,200 international scholars exchange ideas in working groups and present their work in the SIEF journals and our new SIEF book series in Ethnology and Folklore: New Directions in the Study of Everyday Life, Past and Present. This would not happen without the engagement of all of you, magnificent colleagues!

I would like to express my profound gratitude to the Local Organizing Committee, led by Thomas McKean, representing our local host and organizer at the Elphinstone Institute, for diligently and carefully preparing the congress so that everyone can feel welcome at SIEF2025. Thank you, also, for the continuous engagement from the members of the Scientific Committee and the SIEF Board, and to all our brilliant keynote and plenary speakers. Finally, a big hug and thanks to the Nomads: Triinu, Alix, and the rest of the team – our superpowers! A special thanks goes to Rohan, who has retired from the SIEF Congress Admin team; you will remain a legend in SIEF's Congress history.

Unwriting is an invitation for rewriting the current order of things – over the next week, let's make Aberdeen our site for confirming the vigour and societal relevance of ethnology, folklore, anthropology and adjoining fields, while insisting on our right to speak up and think freely!

## **Welcome from the Local Committee**

Dear Congress Participants, SIEF Members and Friends,

Welcome to Aberdeen, Scotland, the Silver City on the golden sands, and to the Elphinstone Institute for Ethnology, Folklore, and Ethnomusicology at the University of Aberdeen. We are delighted to be hosting the 17th SIEF Congress, the largest ever for both our organization and the University, and we thank our partners across the institution for their input and support. The University was founded in 1495 by William Elphinstone, Bishop of Aberdeen and Chancellor of Scotland, and is Scotland's third oldest and the UK's fifth oldest university. Only two years later, the University was first in the English-speaking world to create a Chair of Medicine. From its beginnings, the institution looked outward to Europe and beyond, taking the great European universities of Paris and Bologna as its model.

The Elphinstone Institute was established in 1995 as a bridge between the University and its regions of the North-East and North of Scotland, embodying Bishop Elphinstone's ambition to establish a seat of learning which would be 'open to all and dedicated to the pursuit of truth in the service of others'. Through our partnership model, we take this aim to heart, co-producing research, fostering diversity and access, and learning alongside our numerous community collaborators.

We use ethnographic methodologies to explore ideas of identity and belonging, meaning and function, drawing on an exceptional heritage of traditional music, ballad and song, story, lore and language, alongside the creativity of those who live and work here today. We are interested in how traditions and cultures are created, adapted, reinterpreted and renewed to meet new and challenging circumstances, whether here or abroad. All of these relationships enrich our academic work and increase public understanding of the importance of vernacular culture and creativity in society today.

Scotland has a rich combination of deep-running traditions and pioneering innovations, from old ballads to the invention of colour television, from recently-thatched cottages to cutting-edge wind installations and carbon transition programmes. As folklorist Alan Lomax wrote.

The Scots have the liveliest folk tradition of the British Isles, and paradoxically, it is also the most bookish [...] Everywhere in Scotland I collected songs of written or literary origin from [rural] singers; at the same time, I constantly encountered learned Scotsmen who knew traditional versions of the great folk-songs.

Here in the North-East, that combination of vernacular and book learning continues to inspire the work of the Elphinstone Institute. And with more than 20% of the city's inhabitants having been born outwith the UK, our region is home to lively celebrations, encounters, and adaptations, deep roots and diverse cultures to draw on as we all try to make sense of the world around us.

While you're here in Aberdeen, make sure to explore medieval Old Aberdeen and neighbouring Seaton Park and the Brig o Balgownie (the oldest in Scotland), take a short walk to the beach and river mouth to see the seals and dolphins, visit local museums such as the Aberdeen Maritime Museum, the Art Gallery, or Provost Skene's House, and enjoy the 22:00 sunset at 57°north!

In addition to a busy and diverse academic programme, we're excited to be involving local artisans to demonstrate some of Scotland's traditional crafts – look for them outside Elphinstone Hall at lunchtimes.

Thank you for joining us in Aberdeen, whether in person or online. We look forward to meeting you and hope you make the most of your time with friends and colleagues, both old and new.

# Theme: *Unwriting*

Linguistic, discursive, and reflexive writing has long been a core activity for ethnographers, whether in the field or behind the desk. Ethnology, Folklore, and Anthropology were seen as interpreting the oral 'Other' into the written modern world, with inscription becoming a measure of fact and truth - 'Can I have that in writing?' These acts of mediation often carry with them an innate sense of superiority over the subject and source, even in disciplines that have lionised the oral and material vernaculars from their inception.

*Unwriting* is a powerful tool with which to retract, or rewrite, some of what has been inscribed or recorded, allowing us to reshape that which power has imposed and presenting an opportunity for those who have often only been written about.

SIEF2025 invites ethnologists, folklorists, anthropologists, and scholars from adjacent fields to do some *unwriting*: redo, seek or restore social justice, dismantle hegemonic frameworks which limit us to predetermined paths towards predictable conclusions. We ask for new ways of honouring and ceding space to bottom-up research and analysis, an opportunity for Indigenous and insider scholars to take centre stage, facilitating more equitable scholarly texts for all.

The 'discursive turn' and ideas of 'writing culture' helped to deconstruct academic writing, highlighting the politics of text and connections with practices, institutions, and spaces that produce discipline, hierarchy, and power. *Unwriting* further suggests a constructive, or even activist role focusing on practices, materiality, and life, while supporting decolonial, feminist, and more-than-human perspectives. It asks us to revisit the consequences of casually accepted paradigms, confronting the unseen, unheard, untellable, or untouched. It invites us to explore undocumented social and material practices of *unwriting* in practice-based, multi-media, multi-sensual research, incorporating the input of valued partners.

*Unwriting* works in interdependent symbiosis with writing. In a world of surveillance, we examine the forms of our communications - verbal, in small delimited groups, with encrypted messaging - due to fears of being seen (read). Here, *unwriting* becomes a mechanism of security, safety, control, all the while avoiding outside control, but when can this engender (self)censorship?

Unwriting is a call to action, a call to reflect on how we have been doing things and how they can be done differently. In contrast with the sometimes dark histories of our academic traditions, we have a chance to create new, embedded, and relational visions, distancing ourselves from skewed, hegemonically generated accounts of the past. By unwriting, we consider what it takes to undo some of what writing's power has imposed, particularly as we cede space to AI and its algorithms.

Ultimately, *unwriting* challenges us to create anew in multidimensional ways.

- How can unwriting redress power relations, colonialism, globalisation, heteronormativity, and other hegemonies?
- How could we unwrite legal, social, and political understandings of inclusion and exclusion?
- How does *unwriting* relate to ethnographic description, inscription, and transcription?
- How can unwriting knowledges encourage diverse, applied, or artistic interventions and interpretations?
- How does our digital world unwrite?
- How do we tell *unwritten* histories? How do we write the untellable?
- How can unwriting challenge notions of gender, genre, embodiment, affect, and performance?
- How does unwriting afford new formations, transformations, and narrations of multivalent cultural knowledge and heritage?
- In what ways might AI *unwrite* the process of writing itself?
- How can Indigenous knowledge *unwrite*?
- How might unwriting illuminate multi-species entanglements, human-animal relationships, environmental engagement, and the climate crisis?

# **Practical information**

## Using this programme

The timetable on the cover gives the times of the opening, the keynotes, Working Group meetings, panel sessions and other main events. For the timings of specific panels, consult the Programme schedule which shows what is happening chronologically, or the List of panels which lists panels alphabetically by reference, while also showing location and times. For the detail of all events/panels/keynotes consult the chronological Programme schedule. The List of participants at the back of the book aims to help you identify the panels in which particular colleagues will present their work. The map shows the main locations of the congress activities. This Practical information section aims to help you with the practicalities of being in Aberdeen this week.

If you need any help interpreting the information in the conference book, please ask one of the conference team at the reception desk.

## Using the website

Through the congress website, it is possible to do many useful things. The online version of the programme has updated content since the printing of the book, for example omitting papers which sadly withdrew last minute due to unforeseen circumstances. Hovering over participant names on the panel pages will show a short biography of the speaker, and it is possible to contact them there if you'd like to.

Users can also keep track of the panels or events they'd like to attend by clicking on the star symbol next to the title. Whilst logged in, you will then see a star symbol at the top next to the "Participants" button: this will bring you to the list of your own saved events. If unsure, you can also click on "Serendipity": this will randomly generate a list of events for you to have a look at. When logged-in delegates can also see whether colleagues are registered in f2f (face-to-face) or online mode, send emails to colleagues, and view the Zoom link and panel recording (subsequently).

## Timing of panels

Ten 105-minute panel sessions have been scheduled from 3 to 6 June: two sessions on Tuesday, three on Wednesday and Thursday, two sessions on Friday. We are using up to 27 panel rooms at a time, so any one panel is up against that number of alternatives. For the timings of specific panels, consult the Programme schedule that shows what is happening chronologically, or the List of panels that lists panels by reference, which also shows locations and convenors.

## SIEF2025 congress venues

On the opening day, 3 June you should first check in at the reception desk and collect your badge. The reception desk is located in the entrance foyer of the MacRobert Building, King St, Aberdeen AB24 3FX. The congress office (NomadIT) will be located nearby in room MR047, also on the ground floor of the MacRobert Building.

The opening keynote lecture will take place in the Arts Lecture Theatre, 569 King St, Aberdeen AB24 5SU, which is just behind the MacRobert, a three minute walk away. The opening reception will take place thirty minutes later, at Elphinstone Hall, 21 High St, Aberdeen AB24 3EE. A 2 minute walk from the Arts Lecture Theatre.

Plenary events through the week will continue to take place at the Arts Lecture Theatre. Sessions will take place across several buildings, within easy walking distance to one another. They are:

Useful info for getting around in Aberdeen

## **Money**

The currency in the UK is GBP and Euros are rarely accepted anywhere. Since the pandemic, it is very rare that any service would ask for cash only; card and contactless, google pay, apple pay etc. are usable everywhere from market stalls, to buses, to tube stations.

## **Plug Sockets**

Remember to pack adaptors, you will need a British three-prong adapter (if you have US/ European three-prong bear in mind it is a different shape) if you have devices that use other plugs. British sockets also have a switch on them, make sure you switch it on to allow electricity flow and switch it off again before you unplug your device.

## Important emergency contacts

Please ensure you have your insurance card (activated), passport and money with you.

# **Public transport in Aberdeen**

Aberdeen is a very walkable city. Most hotels and accommodation will be around 30-40 minutes walk from the Old Aberdeen campus.

The **First Bus** app gives live updates on buses around the city (including services run by other providers). Buses run from the city centre to the campus around every 10 minutes – the most

regular are are 1, 2 and 1B. 13 and 20 also pass the campus. Note that the timetable becomes less frequent later in the evening.

**Stagecoach buses** operate service 727 between the city centre and Aberdeen airport. They also have an app for timetables and purchasing tickets, or accept contactless payment on board.

## Beach Ballroom (ceilidh venue)

Bus 13 stops just across the street from the venue. From the university campus, get on the bus at Seaton Drive, or in the city centre get on at Guild Street or Castlegate. Ride to the Beach Esplanade.

Bus 1, 2 or 1B: Stop is Urquhart Road. The venue is then a 15 minute walk away.

## **Payment**

For buses and taxis, contactless payment is preferable. On buses there is a 'tap on – tap off' system for contactless payment, otherwise exact cash payment is required. If you do not have contactless capability, it may be easier to buy tickets in advance using the First Bus app, generating a QR code ticket which can be scanned on entering the bus.

**Taxis** can be ordered by calling: +441224 878787; +441224 200200; or +441224 353535. Taxis can also be ordered via the Aberdeen Taxi app, the ComCab-Aberdeen app, uBook by Rainbow City taxis app or the Uber app.

Note: Not every area of the campus is reachable in a car. However, taxis should be able to pull up to Elphinstone Hall (AB24 3DY) and the MacRobert Building car park (AB24 5UA). Both are buildings we will be using heavily through the week, so are advisable pick up points.

## **Parks & Green Spaces**

- Make sure to visit Scotland's oldest bridge, the beautiful Brig o' Balgownie with its
  gothic arch and the occasional seal underneath. It inspired a poem by Aberdeen's very
  own Lord Byron, and it's a quick walk from the University, either through Seaton Park or
  along the roadways.
- Visit the beach and check out the food trucks at the Fittie end (opening times vary, several
  trucks are open only from Thurs-Sun) or walk in the other direction to the mouth of the
  River Don and its nature reserve.
- Fittie itself, right at the south end of the beach, is a lovely community of old fisherman's cottages arranged in two quadrangles. Worth a visit and very welcoming, but please don't peer through people's windows!
- Aberdeen Harbour: just beyond Fittie and eventually connects back to the city centre..
   Nice for a visit at the Deemouth to see the enormous boats going out to sea, often in service of the oil platforms or the 200m-tall wind turbines in the North Sea.
- Walks and trails in Aberdeen there are lots of self-guided walks around different parts
  of the city, especially focused on heritage and green spaces.
- City parks: Seaton Park, Duthie Park, Johnston Gardens, Union Terrace Gardens, Victoria Park, Hazlehead Park, Greyhope Bay.

## **Beyond Aberdeen**

- Newburgh Seal Beach reachable by Stagecoach bus towards Peterhead (61/ X63). A
  manageable half-day trip. There is a small cafe and a restaurant on the village High

- Aden Country Park home to Aberdeenshire Farming Museum and lovely walking trails.
   Take Stagecoach bus 68. The park entrance is then a 15 minute walk.

### Food and drinks in Aberdeen

Aberdeen has a wide selection of bars, cafes, restaurants, and takeaways serving snacks and meals. Prices vary considerably but expect to pay around £15–20 for a main course in a bar or simple restaurant. There are not many dining options in the vicinity of campus, however, and you will probably want to go into the town centre for evening meals. There are regular buses from King Street (see below).

**Booking:** we strongly recommend that you book ahead for evening meals, especially if you are planning to eat in a larger group. Aberdonians tend to eat unusually early, and many eateries will close their kitchens if trade is slow midweek, even if the bar stays open.

**Special diets:** many restaurants will be able to accommodate special diets with advance notice and most will have vegetarian/vegan and gluten free options on the standard menu.

**Tips:** tipping is discretionary, but it is customary to tip c.10% for table service in restaurants (and in taxis). You may find a discretionary service charge already added to your bill, especially if you are dining in a larger group, so check before leaving extra. If you are dining in a larger group but intend to pay individually, it is worth signalling this to your server at the outset.

**Beach Food Vans:** There are a good number of food vans (south end), some with outdoor seating.

**Take away:** the best apps for local delivery are Deliveroo and Just Eat. Take away is generally available until later in the evening.

Don Kulick and Amy Schuman have worked for decades with, and written books about, people who easily can be labelled as 'vulnerable': villagers in Papua New Guinea who have abandoned their traditions and their language; trans sex workers in Brazil; asylum seekers in the US and UK; and people with disabilities in North America and Europe. Both have written extensively about language, discourse, and practice, and both write with a strong commitment to social justice. This session takes the form of a conversation about topics such as hesitancy and doubt (both epistemologically and practically), witnessing, responsibility, stigma, and audience. Audience participation and comment will be welcomed and encouraged.

Don Kulick is Distinguished University Professor of Anthropology at Uppsala University, where he directs the Engaging Vulnerability research program and the ERC Advanced Grant research project "Out of Sight". His books include Travesti: sex, gender and culture among Brazilian transgendered prostitutes (1998, U Chicago Press); Loneliness and its Opposite: sex, disability and the ethics of engagement (with Jens Rydström, 2015, Duke U Press); A Death in the Rainforest: how a language and a way of life came to an end in Papua New Guinea (2019, Algonquin Books), and the forthcoming Clashing Vulnerabilities: disabilities in conflict (edited with Simo Vehmas, Routledge). He is currently beginning a research project on Papua New Guineans who work in slaughterhouses in Western Australia.

Amy Shuman is Professor Emerita of Folklore in the Department of English at The Ohio State University. She is a Guggenheim Fellow and received a Lifetime Achievement Award from the American Folklore Society. She is the author of four books: Storytelling Rights: the uses of oral and written texts among urban adolescents; Other People's Stories: Entitlement Claims and the Critique of Empathy; Rejecting Refugees: Political Asylum in the 21st Century (with Carol Bohmer); and Political Asylum Deceptions: The Culture of Suspicion (with Carol Bohmer). Her edited books include The Stigmatized Vernacular (with Diane Goldstein) and Technologies of Suspicion and the Ethics of Obligation in Political Asylum. Her primary area of research is narrative, including narratives about disability and political asylum, and she is completing a book on the artisan stonecarvers of Pietrasanta, Italy.

Indigenous Knowledge is also alive and well – it emerges and shows itself in those spaces between us in all our relations. Through building intentional, thoughtful and loving relationships we also strengthen Indigenous Knowledge. Through Recentering collaborative Relationships with the Land and Knowledge, we have the opportunity to bring ourselves back into harmony within our communities, our research and our environment to co-create a more loving cosmos.

**Shawn Wilson** is from the Opaskwayak Cree Nation in northern Canada and lives on Syilx territory in Kelowna, British Columbia. He is an Associate Professor of Indigenous Studies at the University of British Columbia Okanagan. Shawn has worked with Indigenous people worldwide and has spent time living, teaching and researching across Canada, the US, Australia, and Norway, along with supervising research projects in Bangladesh, Indonesia and Papua New Guinea. He is on the Board of Directors with the Tapestry Institute and has joined the newly established advisory group at the Smithsonian National Museum of the American Indian. Shawn has presented at Goals House (Davos) as part of the World Economic Forum and the Mir Centre for Peace. His cites his 3 kids as his greatest achievement, pride and joy.

## ${\bf Plenary: Unwriting \ History - Making \ space \ and \ throwing \ shapes \ in \ archives \ of \ tradition} \ Cliona \ O'Carroll$

Arts Lecture Theatre

'Throwing shapes' is an expression that suggests flamboyance and playfulness, challenging us to pay attention or respond. Is it time to throw shapes in folklore and tradition archives, and assert our distinctiveness and huge potential?

Archives of tradition and their formation break with the norm regarding whose lives were documented and what made it 'into the record'. The interest in vernacular culture represented a broadening of focus, but gaps and silences remain, particularly in the ways archives of tradition and everyday life are constructed, presented and interacted with.

Traditional archives have risen to the challenge of documenting human life in all its messiness, aspiring to long-term relationships with individuals and communities. We currently have an opportunity to build on our wonderful peculiarities, creating a wider stage for our contents, communities and methods.

I will explore these themes by reflecting on the community-based archives of the Cork Folklore Project, on our engagement with our audio holdings, with our locality and its people, and with broader STEM-inflected projects. With new ideas, agendas, and technologies, archives have a huge amount to offer to the public, to our own disciplines, to qualitative data preservation in general, to mainstream archiving, and to the broader scientific community.

Clíona O'Carroll is a native of Cork city, Ireland, where she lectures in Folklore and Ethnology/Béaloideas in University College, Cork. She is Research Director (since 2010) with the Cork Folklore Project, a community-based centre for oral testimony that has collected and archived more than 900 ethnographic interviews exploring the everyday and the extraordinary in Cork's past and present since its inception in 1996. Clíona has co-ordinated collection projects, radio productions, exhibitions and online digital memory-mapping projects with the CFP. Most recently, she has been active in projects foregrounding oral testimony in the stimulation of public conversations on health, infectious disease and sustainability. A member of the SIEF Working Group on Archives, she is active in the development and promotion of archives of tradition.

### **Closing Plenary: Unwriting and Resisting**

Fatin Abbas, Silvy Chakkalakal, Todd Sekuler, Jess Smith Arts Lecture Theatre

This panel discussion explores the concept of "unwriting" as a means of revisiting and reshaping established narratives and power structures, particularly archival knowledge. It delves into how unsettling the archive and engaging in counter-archiving practices can empower marginalized voices and challenge hegemonic frameworks.

The session will further examine the potential of counter-narrating to foster more equitable representations of history, knowledge, and culture. Focusing on the question, among others, of "how can unwriting challenge notions of gender, genre, embodiment, affect, and performance". The discussion will ultimately ask how we can undo the power of writing that has traditionally defined "those who have only been written about."

**Fatin Abbas** is a writer and scholar whose work lies at the intersection of African and Middle Eastern studies, literature, migration, gender and visual studies. She is the author of Ghost Season: A Novel (2023), set in the borderlands of Sudan and South Sudan, and the non-fiction collection Black Time: Essays on the Invisible (2025). She holds a PhD in Comparative Literature from Harvard University.

Silvy Chakkalakal has held the Chair of Popular Literatures and Media at the Department of Social Anthropology and Cultural Studies (ISEK) at the University of Zurich (UZH) since August 1, 2023. Until 2023, she was a board member of the Collaborative Research Center (SFB) 1512 "Intervening Arts," where she is currently involved in three subprojects. She is a member of the "Zentrum Künste und Kulturtheorie" (ZKK) and part of the program leadership of the Doctoral Laboratory "Epistemologies of Aesthetic Practices" at ZHdK, UZH, ETH, and Collegium Helveticum. She is an editor of Geschichte der Gegenwart. She is the author of "Indienliebe. Die frühe Ethnographie und ihre Bilder" (Kadmos 2024) and "Die Welt in Bildern" (Walltstein 2014). Her work is influenced by feminist, queer, and postcolonial theory.

**Todd Sekuler** is Oberassistent in Popular Cultures at the Department of Social Anthropology and Cultural Studies of the University of Zürich. He holds a Master in Public Health from Columbia University's Mailman School of Public Health and a PhD in European Ethnology from Humboldt Universität zu Berlin. His current research engages with newly emerging objects from pre-Holocaust Jewish life in Tarnów, Poland, including a family film and photographic materials from a so-called race study by two anthropologists. Additional ongoing research themes include counter-memory, criminalisation, and alternative modes of knowledge production and ethnographic practice.

Jess Smith: Born into a Scottish Travelling family, at the age of five, my father acquired a single decker bus which served, for ten years, home to my parents and seven sisters. From those early years, my lived experience was close to nature and respect for the land. At the age of fifty, I decided to follow a lifelong dream of becoming a writer of my culture. Three autobiographical books, one story book, a novel, a factual book on the treatment of Travellers through history. Latest book is a collection of voices featured in my journeys.

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
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
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
