The rapid digitalization of the world has drastically changed the archivist's work. Increasingly, archive material is borndigital or digitalized. Records of the digital archive can be processed, accessed and disseminated in unprecedented ways. Moreover, digital solutions open new possibilities for archival collaboration across national and linguistic borders.
